Setting the Heart

Scholars and theologians use a lot of lofty words to describe biblical unity. But in today's language, there's not a better way to sum it up than a little word we use every day. Us.

²⁶ Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground." ²⁷ So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

-Genesis 1:26-27

From the looks of this passage, unity has been on God's mind from day one (actually, day six). The "us" in Genesis 1:26 is the Bible's first mention of the Trinity (*tri-unity*)—God the Father, His Son Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Mankind was originally made in the image of that "us." Operative word: *originally*.

Digging In

With Adam's and Eve's fateful bite of the fruit came a heart-wrenching separation between God and mankind. This universal separation between God and man has shown up in the spiritual DNA of every person born from that point forward. And therein lies the redemptive story that runs throughout the Bible—God's mission to reunite what was separated.

Read Colossians 1:17–23 from your leader Scripture sheet. In this letter to believers, we learn Jesus' role in God's mission to reunite what was separated through sin. As you read this passage:

- 1. Mark every mention of Jesus with a cross \uparrow . (By the way, the first "He" refers to Jesus.)
- 2. Circle every reference to the readers of this letter.

After you've read and marked the verses, note below anything from the passage that supports Genesis 1:26–27 ("Setting the Heart") above.

Personal Prep Session 1

Now jot down a few things from Colossians 1:17–23 that describe us before a relationship with Christ. How are we described *after* Christ in Colossians 1? Taking It Inward Your soul, built for communion with God, is reaching to bridge the gap created by Adam's sin. It's literally straining to connect with what it hungers and thirsts for: God. This straining creates an inner turmoil, which the Bible describes as a war in which the human soul becomes the very enemy of what it longs for. But Colossians 1 tells us that the blood of Christ bridged the gap and brought peace to replace the turmoil, making it possible for our souls to receive what they were designed to have. Quick question: Looking at Colossians 1:21–22, who was reconciled? Can you tell what was reconciled or to whom you were reconciled? This next point is tricky. Going by this passage, you were reconciled to...you! Have you ever thought of salvation like that? By becoming reconciled to God, you have been personally unified! The two enemies inside you were brought together in peace. But not only that. The gaping chasm between you and God was closed. Spend some time thinking about this miracle and praying about what it means in your life. Journal below

Digging Deeper—Part 1

As you might suspect, unity and reconciliation aren't just meant for believers' insides. The unity we experience with God is designed to spill into our relationships with other believers. In fact, this was the subject of Jesus' last intimate talk with His closest friends and of His longest recorded prayer. Take a few minutes to get familiar with this prayer by reading John 17 in its entirety. Once you've finished, we'll dissect Jesus' request in John 17:20-23.

Using your leader Scripture sheet (p. 15), look for the following in John 17:20–23:

- 1. Who Jesus prayed for. (Circle this.)
- 2. What Jesus prayed for. (Put a box around this.)
- 3. Anything that could describe how to achieve what Jesus prayed for. (Underline this.)
- 4. Anything that could explain why He prayed for this. (Draw a wavy line under this.)

After you've read and marked the passage, answer the following questions in as much detail

Digging Deeper—Part 2

Be sure to keep track of the questions you noted, and watch how the Lord answers them as you search His Word in the next few weeks.

Under question 3, you noted the model for unity given in Jesus' prayer—that believers may be one "just as you are in me and I am in you." Today's quest is to examine the relationship between Jesus and His Father in order to better understand the unity He desires in us.

Jesus had much to say about His relationship with the Father, as did several other New Testament writers. As you read the following verses, underline anything that describes the relationship between Jesus and His Father. Then take another lap through the passages, and jot in the right-hand column a one-word trait or short phrase that describes the relationship. (A heads-up: You won't be covering all of these passage with your students, so be sure to compare this chart with the one given in the Session 1 Group Guide.)

Rather, it is the Father, living in me, who is doing his work. ¹¹ Believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; or at least believe on the evidence of the miracles themselves. ¹² I tell you the truth, anyone who has faith in me will do what I have been doing. He will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³ And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Son may bring glory to the Father."	
[Jesus is speaking.] John 14:19–21 ¹⁹ "Before long, the world will not see me anymore, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live. ²⁰ On that day you will realize that I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you. ²¹ Whoever has my commands and obeys them, he is the one who loves me. He who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I too will love him and show myself to him."	

Taking It Inward

By now the right column in the chart should have several words and phrases that describe the special relationship between Jesus and His Father. More specifically, these words and phrases describe what it means for the Father to be *in* the Son and the Son *in* the Father, as Jesus described in John 17:21. On a personal level, these words and phrases describe the unique relationship believers should have with each other.

Take a minute or two to meditate on your descriptions, and write below any new insights on Jesus' request in John 17:21.

This is the type of relationship that Jesus prays we will have with each other and with Him. Think of the different categories of believers you typically interact with, and in each space below, write the name of someone who represents the category. Imagine Jesus praying this prayer for you and each person you list.

How do your relationships with other believers need to change to reflect the amazing relationship between God and Jesus?

This is Jesus' model of unity among believers: A circle of relationships that are characterized by mutual dependence, mutual submission, mutual love and mutual trust. How does this picture differ from the picture of unity you've been exhibiting lately?

Wrapping It Up

Two big concepts you'll want to help your students grab from this session:

- 1. All of us were built for connection and relationship—a connection that was severed by sin and restored by salvation through Jesus Christ.
- 2. All of our connections with other believers are supposed to model the special relationship between Jesus and His Father.

Take a few minutes to read the Group Guide and get familiar with the exercises and confident with the flow of the session. Since it's the first session, allow time to photocopy the student sheets and gather supplies (see "Materials Needed" in the Session 1 Group Guide.) One Week Out

Challenge your students to read John 17 before the first session. You may also want to send out reminder notes about where and when the group will meet. Be sure to commend your students for committing to be part of an in-depth study of God's Word. As you plan the first session, don't be afraid to create an atmosphere of challenge and intensity.

Materials Needed

For this session each student will need: **1** student journal pages for Session 1;

2 Scripture sheets for Session 1; 3 a copy of the student review page.

You'll also need a dry-erase board and a pack of colored pencils. Students should bring their own Bibles and pens.

Session Intro

Goals of Session 1

As students experience this session, they will...

- be introduced to a very personal kind of unity.
- explore in detail Jesus' prayer for unity.
- discover the nature of Jesus' relationship with God.
- be challenged to imitate key aspects of that relationship.

Prayer

Once the group has gathered, **pray** that through this study, each student will go deeper with Jesus...perhaps even deeper than they thought possible. Ask the Lord to help them make His Word a part of their lifelong pursuit of Him.

Open

Open the session with a **free-for-all discussion** of one or more of these questions:

What animal makes the best pet?

If you could make a pet out of a wild animal, what animal would you choose?

Why do we have pets at all?

Transition into study mode by offering the explanation that pets give us unconditional love and loyalty (except, of course, for cats). Human beings were built for relationship, and our attraction to pets could be evidence of the way we're wired.

Digging In—Beginning, Middle and Now

Ask your students to read the verses from Genesis and Colossians printed on their Scripture sheets (student p. 5). As they read, they should use a special color or symbol to mark every reference to themselves. They'll be looking for words like "man" and "you."

After they're read and marked the verses, share that these two passages represent three phases: "beginning" (mankind at Creation), "middle" (mankind after sin entered the world) and "now" (our state once we've accepted Christ).

With that in mind, **discuss the following questions**. Ask your students to record their responses in the space provided on their journal pages (student p. 3).

How does Genesis 1 describe us in the beginning?

-made in the image of "us"; "us" refers to the three persons of the Trinity

How does Colossians 1 describe us after man sinned (the middle phase)?

-alienated from God (v. 21)

-enemies in our minds because of our evil behavior (v. 21)

How does Colossians 1 describe us now (if we're believers in Christ)?

-reconciled by Christ's physical body (v. 22)

-holy in His sight (v. 22)

-without blemish (v. 22)

-free from accusation (v. 22)

How would you define "reconciled"?

Let the students kick this around, eventually guiding them to these points:

- The word "reconciled" implies that there was a separation, but that whatever was separated has been brought together.
- You may want to read Colossians 1:22 from The Message: "...Christ brought you over to God's side and put your lives together, whole and holy in his presence."

Taking It Inward—The Inside Picture

Ask your students to get a better mental picture of what God does on the insides of believers by drawing a diagram or sketch (or writing a poem or descriptive paragraph) depicting it on their journal pages (student p. 3). If they're short on ideas, have them read 2 Corinthians 5:17–21 and make these verses part of the picture.

After about five minutes, ask a few volunteers to share their creations.

Digging Deeper—Part 1

Tell the group that throughout the New Testament, God uses words like "reconciled" to describe what happens between Himself and anyone who follows Christ. Jesus expanded on the idea when He prayed for His disciples in John 17. Explain that John 17 is a prayer Jesus prayed for His closest friends on earth, just before He was arrested and put to death. But Jesus didn't only pray for the twelve disciples, as they'll see in John 17:20–23.

Ask your students to read this passage from their Scripture sheets (student p. 5). As they read, they should mark each of the following with a different color or symbol:

- 1. Who Jesus prayed for.
- 2. What Jesus prayed for.
- 3. Anything that describes how to achieve what Jesus prayed for.
- 4. Anything that explains why He prayed this.

Now discuss the questions below, taking time to record the students' answers on the board. Invite the group to write the info on their journal pages (student pp. 3–4) as well. As the session unfolds you'll be diving deeper into Jesus' prayer, so for now, go for simple observations.

1. Who did Jesus pray for?

- -the apostles (v. 20)
- -us: those who will believe through the message of the apostles (v. 20)
- 2. What was Jesus praying for?
- -unity: that we all may be one (v. 21)
- 3. How did He describe that unity?

-just as the Father is in Jesus and Jesus is in the Father (v. 21)

- 4. What will happen as a result of Jesus' request?
- -the world will know that God sent Jesus (vv. 21, 23)
- 5. Any thoughts or questions so far about Jesus' prayer? In your opinion, has what Jesus prayed for been fulfilled?

Digging Deeper—Part 2

Share that the key to experiencing Jesus' prayer is understanding the kind of unity He wants His followers to have. The model He gave is His own relationship with His Father, God. For the next few minutes, the group will be exploring that model by studying other Bible passages that describe it.

Ask your students to find a place where they can get alone with God, like a corner of the room or a hallway or empty room nearby. The goal is finding a spot where they can focus on God's Word without much distraction. Before they head out, make sure they understand the following instructions.

Printed in the chart on their Scripture sheets (student p. 6) are passages that describe the special relationship between God and Jesus. As they read these verses, they should underline anything that describes this relationship. After they've read all the verses, they should go back and jot down one-word traits or short phrases that best describe the relationship. The chart is printed on the following page with suggested descriptions for the leader's reference.

Taking It Inward

When most have finished "Digging Deeper—Part 2" (it's okay if not everyone has) call the group back together. In the right-hand column of their charts, the students should have written several words and phrases that describe Jesus' relationship with His Father. Explain that these words and phrases describe what it means for the Father to be "in" the Son and the Son "in" the Father (John 17:21). On a more personal level, they describe the kind of relationship Jesus wants between us.

Discuss any new insights your students have had on the kind of unity Jesus is looking for among believers. You could start the discussion like this:

So, what was Jesus asking for when He prayed that we might be one as He and the Father are *one*?

Try to elicit that Jesus was praying that relationships between believers be built on trust, dependence, obedience, love and submission—the same traits that define His relationship with the Father.

Explain that this is the kind of relationship Jesus wants us to have with one another and with Him. Ask them to think about the Christian friends and family members they typically hang out with. In the spaces provided on their journal pages (student p. 4), have them write the name of a person in each group.

Wrapping It Up

To wrap up the session, **get back to the "why" of Jesus' prayer for unity.** Why is unity among believers so important to Christ? As the students discuss the following questions, keep track of their answers and ideas. Later in the study you'll be diving into specifics on these questions.
