

## An Early Deconstruction Story: Psalm 73

He was a nationally known worship leader. He held company with the top spiritual leaders of his era. Dishearteningly, he went through a serious deconstruction of his faith and made a public profession of his process. You may not recognize his name, but you may be aware of his work. Thankfully, he journaled his process, a journal that became Psalm 73. As you explore this psalm, in the left-hand column ("Asaph"), journal your observations about Asaph's process: What was he thinking? What were his weak spots? In the right-hand column ("You"), take Psalm 73 personally. If you were to write Psalm 73 from your personal journey, how would you parallel Asaph's journey? 	<sup>11</sup> They say, "How would God know? Does the Most High know anything?"	
	They say, How would dou know? Does the Most Fight know anything?  12 This is what the wicked are like—free of care, they go on amassing

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	innocence.  14 All day long I have been afflicted, and every morning brings new punish-	
	ments.  15 If I had spoken out like that, I would have betrayed your children.
